# Special extra-disciplinary interest

In 1974 a NEH Study Grant allowed me to attend graduate seminars in the University of Pennsylvania's Graduate Program in Folklore and Folklife. My interest in oral folklore and performance genres led to repeated visits as auditor in that program, presentations at the American Folklore Society's annual meetings, and the creation (with a colleague in the English Department) of a new Introduction to Folklore course for Haverford College. I have a particular interest in the folktale, which, combined with my knowledge of Sicilian dialect, led to collaboration with noted folktale scholar Jack Zipes in the 2-volume English version of G. Pitré's important folktale collection (2009 book). My interest in proverbs and other (non-epic) oral genres appears in several of my articles (1983, 1997b, 1999a, 1999 b, 2009).
